REVIEW VOCABULARY

Alignment

The placement, position, orientation, and grouping of elements so that they line up clearly.

Block Level Elements

Elements that begin on their own line are called block level.

(for example: `<p>`, `<h1>`, `<div>`, etc)

HTML Table (`<table></table>`)

A collection of data about a particular subject that is organized in columns and rows.

HTML Table Cell

One single grouping within a table. For example, on a multiplication table, 9 is in a cell, 3 is in a cell, and 27 is in a cell. You might also think of a table cell like a single box within a table.

Inline Level Elements

Elements that stay within the line they are already in without falling down to the next line.

(for example: `<a>`, ``, ``, etc)

Layout

This is a graphic organizer that helps a designer to arrange the visual elements of a page and make sure that people who view the page see/find the most important information.
